

DECEMBER 5, 2006

The Harriman City council met in regular session Tuesday December 5th, 2006 at 7:30 p.m. in the Conference Room of the Harriman Municipal/Utility Building. The Honorable Jerry Davis Mayor was present and presiding. Mayor called meeting to order. Roll call of Council was as follows:

Mayor Davis asked for a motion to approve the minutes from 11/14 Councilmember Wright made the motion and was seconded by Councilmember Gallaher. The motion passed with a unanimous "Aye".

Mayor Davis asked for a motion to pay the salaries. Councilmember Mason made the motion and was seconded by Councilmember Tedder. The motion passed with a unanimous "Aye".

Mayor Davis called to hear delegations.

Chief Randy Heidle asked council if they would approve purchasing new uniforms for police officers. He stated the cost would be \$3532.00. The motion was made by Councilmember Mason and seconded by Councilmember Wright. The motion passed with a unanimous "Aye".

Chief Heidle also invited council and the mayor to the police department Christmas party on December 15th at 6:00 at the police station.


OLD BUSINESS

Cingular bill-police-City Attorney Harold Balcom explained to council that in April 2005 the police department had a verbal agreement with Cingular Wireless to purchase service and 6 phone units. However the phones were only used for two to three weeks and the bill was for \$2290.00. According to Tim Phillips, ex-assistant chief, he tried numerous times to cancel the agreement and have the phones picked up. There was never any written agreement signed. After discussion it was decided that Attorney Balcom would contact the collection agency and offer to send the phones back and pay either half or the difference in the total bill minus the phones.

AGENDA

Surplus Property Mayor Davis recommended having Charles Kerley and/or Maria Nelson represent the City of Harriman at the property surplus sale on December 11th. The motion was made Councilmember Gallaher and seconded by Councilmember Tedder. The motion passed with a unanimous "Aye".

Police Car Bids -Mayor Davis stated that the bid from Ted Russell Ford was approximately five hundred dollars cheaper than the one from Jerry Duncan Ford for the three police cars. Mayor Davis asked if the bids were for the same car. The answer was yes except for the pre-wired harness, which was interpreted different by the two bidders. Attorney Balcom suggested re-bidding the cars. It was decided to place the ad in the paper on Friday, take bids until the next Friday and have a special call meeting on the 18th to make a decision and get the cars ordered. The motion was made to re-bid by Councilmember Mason and seconded by Councilmember Sampson. The motion passed with a unanimous "Aye". There being no further business meeting adjourned.
